Also present Katelyn McElmoyl Township Attorney; Chief/Township Administrator Kyle Wilson and Township Clerk Caryn Hoyer. Committeeman Shreekant Dhopte was not present.

Mr. Liedtka made a motion seconded by Ms. Koetas-Dale to approve the January 3, 2019, December 27, 2018 Special and Regular minutes as well as the monthly report for Tax Collector, Construction, Municipal Court, MTAC, Sewer Operator and 2018 Planning Board Annual Report. All were in favor.

TOWNSHIP ENGINEER REPORT

(Mr. Hirsh was not present but gave a written report) 2016 Municipal Parks Grant Application: 1/24/2019 – Reimbursement request has been submitted.

Various Tasks:

Working w/Administrator on additional streetlight on Thorn: Section 170-28 indicates the Township prefers streetlights only at intersections, dangerous curves or other areas determined necessary in the name of public safety. Section 130-81 prescribes local, residential roadways have 0.4 foot candles of illumination. Without testing, Thorn Lane, in the area of =/- house #11 does not appear to meet this minimum. The Developer was not required to install a light in said location. The Township may elect to install the light, at the cost of \$10,854.58, quoted in April 2018 by PSE&G. The current cost may have changed.

On Preservation Boulevard, heading into Phase 6 of Heritage North, we were requested to look into potentially adding a light at the culvert crossing. The Developer appears to have installed their lighting according to their approval. ERI will perform a night light meter test to confirm existing lighting levels next week. There could also be other

factors reducing the light in the rea of the culvert crossings (ie. Street trees blocking the lights, etc.)

Working w/ Administrator on speed study on Church Street (by Feb 2019):

Determined that 85th percentile speed is 25 mph with the average speed being 21 mph.

My understanding is that the Township can elect to statutorily raise or lower a speed limit if there is enough engineering evidence to recommend same (ie. Sped studies, roadway geometry, accident history, etc.), but we do not see that data in this scenario.

Lowering the speed limit does not appear to be justified from an engineering standpoint.

<u>Working w/ Public Works on roadway ranking system/evaluation-</u> Greg indicated he was going to take care of ranking the roads.

<u>Recreation Survey:</u> Working on preparing concepts and estimates for various recreation improvements at Fenton Lane Park and Chesterfield Park. Meeting with factory rep Friday 1/25 to review scope for budget estimates.

RESOLUTION OF THE CHESTERFIELD TOWNSHIP COMMITTEE ADOPTING THE LOCAL FINANCE BOARD'S APPROVAL OF AND CONDITION TO THE CONSOLIDATION PLAN REGARDING THE TOWNSHIP'S TWO FIRE DISTRICTS AS REQUIRED BY N.J.S.A. 40A:14-90.2

WHEREAS, representatives for Chesterfield Township's two (2) Fire Districts have contemplated consolidation for more than a decade, and in October of 2018, the Chesterfield Township Committee submitted a formal application to the Local Finance Board ("LFB") seeking approval to consolidate Chesterfield Township's Fire Districts Nos. 1 and 2, which application was subsequently supplemented and modified in consultation with LFB staff, culminating ultimately in Chesterfield Township's application being scheduled for discussion at the LFB's January 9, 2019 and January 18, 2019 public meetings; and

WHEREAS, during the January 18, 2019 public meeting of the LFB, a quorum of eight (8) LFB members unanimously voted to approve Chesterfield Township's application for consolidation pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40A:14-90.2, "Consolidating two or more fire districts within one municipality;" and

WHEREAS, a small portion of Hamilton Township (Mercer County) consisting of approximately 30 households and referred to as "North Crosswicks," has historically received fire protection services from Chesterfield Township Fire District No. 1, dating back to approximately 1879, and Hamilton Township desires to continue receiving those fire protection services from Chesterfield's Consolidated Fire District No. 1; and

WHEREAS, the LFB's January 18, 2019 approval was conditioned on the execution of an agreement between Hamilton Township and Chesterfield's Consolidated Fire District No. 1 prior to the Consolidated Fire District's submission of its 2020 budget to the Department of Community Affairs, Division of Local Government Services, with a copy of the executed agreement delivered to the Division of Local Government Services upon final execution; and

WHEREAS, while Chesterfield Township would not be a party to this agreement, and has little control over the negotiation and execution of such an agreement between two other public entities, the Township Committee finds it appropriate to adopt this Resolution acknowledging the LFB's approval of Chesterfield Township's application for consolidation and accompanying condition, as such a Resolution is required by the operative fire district consolidation statute, N.J.S.A. 40A:14-90.2; and

WHEREAS, a draft agreement was provided to the Business Administrator and Township Solicitor of Hamilton Township on January 9, 2019, and, during a public meeting on January 15, 2019, the Township Council verbally authorized its Solicitor to

work with representatives for the Consolidated Fire District to finalize and execute the agreement in the near future.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Township Committee of the Township of Chesterfield, County of Burlington, State of New Jersey, as follows:

- 1. Pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40A:14-90.2, the Township Committee hereby acknowledges and adopts the Local Finance Board's January 18, 2019 approval of the application for consolidation of Fire Districts Nos. 1 and 2, noting one condition (described in detail above).
- 2. Pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40A:14-90.2, the assets and debts of Fire Districts Nos. 1 and 2 shall be reapportioned pursuant to the approved consolidation plan and 2019 consolidated budget.
- 3. Pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40A:14-90.2, the consolidation shall become fully operative after the February 16, 2019 election during which the public shall elect five (5) Commissioners for Chesterfield's <u>Consolidated</u> Fire District No. 1, whose terms shall be decided by drawing lots at the first meeting of the newly elected Board of Fire Commissioners, pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40A:14-70.
- 4. The Chesterfield Township Solicitor is directed to assist, as necessary and as may be requested by representatives of Chesterfield's Consolidated Fire District No. 1, in finalizing and executing the agreement to ensure satisfaction of the Local Finance Board's single condition of the January 18, 2019 approval.
- 5. The Chesterfield Township Clerk is directed to forward certified copies of this Resolution to the New Jersey Division of Local Government Services, the Township of Hamilton, and the Board of Commissioners for Chesterfield Township Fire Districts Nos. 1 and 2.

WHEREAS, the Township of Chesterfield wishes to apply for funding of approximately \$25,000 with a match of \$135,241.83 for an approximate project total

cost of \$160,241.83 for a project under the State of New Jersey Safe and Secure Communities Grant Program #19-0307; and

WHEREAS, the subaward period is 2/27/19 through 2/26/20; and

WHEREAS, the Chesterfield Township Committee has reviewed the accompanying application and has approved said request; and

WHEREAS, the project is a joint effort between the Department of Law and Public Safety and the Township of Chesterfield for the purpose described in the application;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Township Committee of the Township of Chesterfield in the County of Burlington and State of New Jersey that:

- 1. As a matter of public policy the Township of Chesterfield wishes to participate to the fullest extent possible with the Department of Law and Public Safety.
- 2. The Attorney General will receive funds on behalf of the applicant.
- 3. The Division of Criminal Justice shall be responsible for the receipt and review of the applications for said funds.
- 4. The Division of Criminal Justice shall initiate allocations to each applicant as authorized.
- 5. The Mayor is authorized to sign the necessary documents for said grant.

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Payment of Bills

Ms. Koetas-Dale made a motion seconded by Mr. Liedtka to approve the bill list. All were in favor.

Discussion

Street Lights:

Mr. Wilson refered to page 6 of Mr. Hirsh's report (in his absence)

Mr. Hirsh reported that Section 170-28 indicates the Township prefers streetlights only at intersections, dangerous curves or other areas determined necessary in the name of public safety. Section 130-81 prescribes local, residential roadways have 0.4 foot candles of illumination. Without testing, Thorn Lane, in the area of =/- house #11 does not appear to meet this minimum. The Developer was not required to install a light in said location. The Township may elect to install the light, at the cost of \$10,854.58, quoted in April 2018 by PSE&G. The current cost may have changed.

On Preservation Boulevard, heading into Phase 6 of Heritage North, we were requested to look into potentially adding a light at the culvert crossing. The Developer appears to have installed their lighting according to their approval. ERI will perform a night light meter test to confirm existing lighting levels next week. There could also be other factors reducing the light in the rea of the culvert crossings (ie. Street trees blocking the lights, etc.)

Ms. Koetas-Dale and Ms. Katz both agreed that they don't want to add a street light just because someone asks for it. They believe this will set a precedence. Chief Wilson believes it may be a safety concern. Chief Wilson and Mr. Hirsh plan to sit down between now and February 14<sup>th</sup> to look into this further. They will have their recommendations by the next meeting.

Knox Box:

Mr. Wilson suggests that we require Knox Box's for the condo units and any new commercial buildings. The Knox Box's will be located in the building's common area and will provide keys for all of the units in case of fire's, etc. so that the fireman can access the units without breaking window, doors, etc. The cost of the knox box would be to the owner. This is very common. Mr. Wilson said that we will need to pass an ordinance and he will have something for the committee at the next meeting.

<u>Preliminary Budget Questions:</u>

Based on the Budget Advisory meetings, Mr. Wilson asked the Township Committee to give direction to the Budget Advisory Committee on how much money they should give to the outside organizations such as the Historical Society, Crosswicks Library and the Community Center. The committee did not make a decision and will get back to him.

Fenton Lane Park Recreation Building Name:

Mr. Wilson stated that Mr. Hirsh had recommended renaming the Fenton Lane Recreation Building in order to get more opportunities for grant funding. He suggested, "Fenton Lane Community & Recreation Center".

Department Liaisons:

Mayor Romeu reported that the Township Committee decided on having two liaisons for each department, same as last year. They will be as following:

Human Resources: Andrea Katz & Rita Romeu

Public Works/Buildings & Grounds: Jeremy Liedtka & Shreekant Dhopte

Recreation: Shreekant Dhopte & Andrea Katz Finance: Denise Koetas-Dale & Shreekant Dhopte

Additionally, there will be sub-committees that the Township Committee will be a part of as follows:

Budget Advisory Committee: Denise Koetas-Dale & Shreekant Dhopte

Municipal Alliance: Andrea Katz

Pipeline Taskforce: Andrea Katz & Rita Romeu

Bike and Pedestrian Paths: Shreekant Dhopte & Rita Romeu Recreation Survey: Andrea Katz & Denise Koetas-Dale

Mayor Romeu stated she would like to see AG Advisory Board created again and meet a couple times a year.

Ms. Katz stated goals for 2019 as Sustainable NJ Certification and more community education regarding eh pipeline status. Mayor Romeu stated there was a letter that went out last year inviting everyone to a public meeting and it was not well attended.

Plowing/Salting County Roads:

Mr. Wilson tabled this discussion for another time due to too many outstanding questions not answered by the County.

Comments to the Public and Committee

Ms. Koetas-Dale made a motion seconded by Ms. Katz to open to the public.

Justin - Hamilton Auto asked about the Towing contract. He heard it was going to be discussed tonight. He had applied to be a tower and has not heard anything yet. Chief Wilson advised him the towing list was approved at the January 3<sup>rd</sup> meeting. Chief Wilson will check the list and get back to him tomorrow.

Hearing no further comments, Mr. Liedtka made a motion seconded by Ms. Koetas-Dale to go into Executive Session at 9:05 PM to discuss litigation regarding the SLR Pipeline and matters of attorney client privilege. All were in favor.
